Born January 31, 1919 in Cairo, Georgia; grew up with his mother and four siblings in Pasadena, California

JACKIE ROBINSON

A naturally gifted athlete, he ran track and played football, baseball, and basketball for UCLA in college.



Served as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army during World War II

Played shortstop for the Kansas City Monarchs, a Negro National League baseball team





Met with Brooklyn Dodgers co-owner Branch Rickey in 1945; Rickey was looking for a gifted African-American player with the restraint to stand up to taunts from bullies and racists to integrate Major League Baseball




On April 15, 1947 played first base for the Brooklyn Dodgers; endured slurs and death threats from angry fans and went on to win the Rookie of the Year Award



Retired from baseball in 1956 and became more active in the civil rights movement



Inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1962; posthumously awarded the Congressional Gold Medal, one of the nation's highest honors, in 2003





Died October 24, 1972
